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Valley Northwest Passage February 11, 2010

Dear Colleagues in Ministry,

Michael Himes, a theology professor who advises students at Boston College, suggests that, when we are facing vocational questions, we should ask ourselves three questions:

- What gives us joy?
- What are we good at?
- Do other people need us to do it?

While Himes conceived of these questions primarily in terms of individual discernment, they can just as easily be asked by a local church. Many churches struggle with questions of mission, ministry, and identity. Who are we? Who is God calling us to become? What is God calling us to do? What if a church began asking itself these same three questions?

What gives us joy? Every church engages in multiple activities. Some clearly bring joy, whether they require great effort or are relatively easy. Others do not bring joy, and some of these require great effort. Joy is much more than feeling good or happy or content with ourselves. It is the sense of peace, calm, and strength that ultimately comes from God's presence in our lives and our aligning our activity with God's purpose for us. Some activities call forth joy and others do not. Even activities that are painful to do can produce joy in the end. If something consistently does not call forth joy, we need to honestly and seriously reflect on whether it is something God is calling us to do. What if the members of a local church began asking this question about the various things they do as a church? Would they have the wisdom and courage to let go of some things that did not bring or call forth joy? Would they have the courage to try some new things that may or may not be joyful?

What are we good at? People have multiple and sometimes conflicting expectations of a church. It is impossible to meet everyone's expectations. Can a local church focus on its strengths and nurture them? Can a local church let go of unrealistic expectations that aren't really from God? A church does not have to limit itself to what it is already doing. It may very discover it is good at a lot of things that it hasn't tried yet. The only way to find out is to try them. But a church also needs to be willing to graciously let go of unrealistic expectations and of things that it may have done well in the past but is no longer able to do now.

Do other people need us to do it? What does God need the church to do, not only for its members but also for the world? The church today has become too focused on itself. As important as our community life is, it can't become our only or even our primary focus. From the day of Pentecost, the church has been called to open its doors and to live God's good news in the world. We need to claim this calling anew.

Himes stresses that vocational discernment for individuals does not take place in a vacuum. We need other people to discern with us, especially about the second and third questions. The same is true of our local churches. Churches need other churches to discern with them who they are and who God is calling them to become. This was the basis of our early associations and conferences. How can churches help each other to claim their joy, assess their strengths, and do God's work in the world?

It's hard to ask these questions and can be even harder answering them honestly. But not asking them at all can, in the end, be even worse. If we don't ask them, we may experience joy less and less often. We may lose the ability to distinguish our strengths from our weaknesses. We may become useless to others and even to ourselves.

Jesus didn't avoid the hard questions. Neither should we.

JUNIOR YOUTH UPDATE

The Junior Youth Group has been learning the about the life of David and how this youngest child of Jesse, a mere shepherd, is chosen by God to be king. They learned of his anointing, his triumph over Goliath, a nine foot giant, and of his love of music and poetry. We spent some time talking about the Psalms and their importance. Throughout the year, we have been spending some time speaking of the word "shepherd" and its significance. We reflect on Moses, David and Jesus and how the word shepherd is appropriate in many senses for all three.

For the month of February, we will be moving our focus to the New Testament and be focusing on the Sermon on the Mount. We will discuss the Beatitudes, what is means to be salt of the earth and the Lords Prayer just to name a few. Learning to worship and serve God with two hands and an open heart is a common theme.

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SEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT Hearts and Hands...Our Faith, our Church

On Saturday, February 20th, many of us gathered at the Pilgrim House with members of our Search Committee for the first of what we hope will be a series of conversations about our Church life: our spiritual hopes and dreams as a congregation, our journey of discovery toward our true purpose and mission as people of God. Our spiritual guide for the day was Rev. Cheryl Anderson, who had met two days prior with the Search Committee to intr4oduce us to the concepts of "affirmative inquiry" and "provocative propositions" as interview and conversational principles to guide us during our "Conversational Cafes".

"Affirmative Inquiry" leads us to seek out our strengths and gifts. We were instructed to frame every question in a positive way, and to answer each question with a positive response. "Provocative Propositions" lead us then to find metaphors to connect who we were, and now are, into the future to who we want to be as a congregation.

After an opening prayer and introductory comments from Cheryl (and delicious breakfast goodies brought by Sharon Milukas), we each chose a partner to ask a series of prepared questions. We were all given the same questions to ask, and each person had 20 minutes to interview their partner. We asked each other to tell a story about our church at its best: to recall a time when we felt most alive, most involved, or most excited about our involvement, how we felt, how we experienced the Holy Spirit among us during that time, who was involved, who did what and when.

We asked each other what we each value about our congregation; what is the single most important thing that our participation in this church has contributed to each of our lives. We asked each other what the greatest strength of our congregation is...what we are best at.

We asked each other what we believe is the core value of our church. What values give life to our congregation: what is it that, if it did not exist, would make our church totally different than it currently is?

Finally, we asked each other this question: if God had three wishes (prayers) for our church, what would they be?

We then re-convened and shared each other's stories. We identified values and themes that came through the interviews, and then listed those things that came through as most creative, faith-affirming, life-giving and valued.

At this point Cheryl asked us to take some time for lunch and personal reflection. She suggested that we each find ways, through art and imagery, to create symbols or metaphorical images of what we were personally feeling after our interviews with each other. Tammy MacDonald shared the symbolism of the Mandala with us as an example of creative imagery. Lunch and art/craft supplies were provided by the Search Committee.

SEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT-CONTINUED

After lunch and reflection, we gathered again, this time to create our "provocative propositions": our statements of what kind of congregation we will b3e from here on into the future. These propositions had to be grounded in reality and had to represent the values and themes we had identified during our time of inquiry. We shared our artistic creations with the group, and as we talked about our work, two particular themes stood out: the love and caring shown daily by the members of our church through our willingness to help others, and that we are a congregation that welcomes all of God's children. This theme was vividly portrayed on paper by Lynn Martin, who had created a circle of hands reaching out, but also through many other pictures using hearts and lights as symbols.

In closing, Rev. Cheryl Anderson read, to those of us gathered, a free-form poem written by Melissa Adam during our time of reflection. It was evident to all of us present that the Holy Spirit was working through Melissa in an extraordinary way to speak to the rest of us. Melissa's reflection is being written out in calligraphy by Barbara Austin, to be framed and shared with us all when ready.

The Search Committee will be calling for more congregational conversations in the months ahead. We thank each of you for so helpfully sharing this journey of discovery with us.
